My Dearest Wife just a line in
reply to yours which is received
yesterday and the parcel which
went down good Dear Wife I can't
get home on Saturday they are
telling them go what been on
Mustering we can't get 48 hours
while we are done Mustering it
will go 10 weeks before we do
that is shall come when I get the
Chance Dear Wife I have been
to Harwich this morning to be
Inoculated we have got 48
hours excuse duty my own to

stiff already taking you and
the children are getting on a bit
i am pleased to hear Brother
Jim is not seriously wounded it
is sad about young Briers but
still it can be helped Dear Wife
i think the Potatoes was taken
very well only we seem to
be starving a bit Dear wife we
have been on several Raids
Marches this week i can tell you
it makes us sweat with full
Pack they called us up the
after morning about 3 o'clock
and marched us about 5 miles
and put us in a bit Wooded
hold it was full of Ferns
it was nice and wet i can

tell you it was very foggy
we had to lay down then till
about half past seven it went
very hot then we came back
again and went out again till
about nine o'clock at night
Dear wife is just been and she
may pay 3 bob i tell you i dont
miscead one week more with
another how is the flour
getting down then i have seen
a field of oats nearly ready
for cutting here they aint
very heavy crops about
here you never said how
C. Elms got on there is not
very many civill about here
all soldiers and sailors

I think I have told you all
this time so I must bring my
letters to a close as my arm
aches give my love to all
them at home so arrange till
we meet again in mass your
loving Husband. Will & Co.
